





Emily McDermott is Assistant Professor of Medical and Veterinary Entomology at the U of A Dept. of Entomology and Plant Pathology. Her research focuses on the biology/control of arthropod vectors of pathogens that cause disease in livestock. She is interested in the role that different tick species play in spreading cattle diseases. It is her goal to develop new tools and recommendations for producers to manage these pests in their herds. She will speak about the biology of the most common tick species found on cattle in Arkansas and how these arthropods cause damage for cattle producers. She will also discuss how ticks on cows should be considered a threat not just to livestock but also to cattlemen.




Convention Center Map





Trade Show Map
